COURSE ONE **Through The Eye Of A Needle: Impasses In Treatment**

Impasses are critical occurrences in psychotherapy and psychoanalysis. The management of impasses can determine whether the therapy continues or falters. This course will review the literature on impasses with a view to providing a look at the resources in the literature that have a potential to help the clinician. The material has been organized into four sections: the definition of impasse; transferences that are commonly associated with the occurrence of impasses; countertransference responses to impasses; and, suggested remedies in the occurrence of an impasse. Each section will occupy one evening. Opportunities will be provided for the discussion of clinical cases.

COURSE TWO **Lacan Unpacked**

The study of Jacques Lacan and his contemporary followers provides important contributions to the psychoanalytic understanding and treatment of "modern" patients, clients and subjects wherever they present or are found. This course will explore three areas of focus: differentiating structural diagnostic characteristics of four major groups and their implications for treatment; a language-based approach to the identification and treatment of persons with extraordinary and ordinary psychosis; and, the conditions and possibilities for the use of Lacanian theory and technique in the practice of psychoanalytic psychotherapy. They will be presented in a series of nine sessions, each three hours, in the following groups of three:

- September 15, October 20, December 1 – Structural Diagnostic Differences: Neurosis, Perversion, Ordinary Psychosis, Autism
- September 29, November 10, December 8 – Psychosis: The Name-of-the-Father, Diagnosis, Treatment
- October 6, November 17, December 15 – Lacanian Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy: Origins, Deadlocks, Possibilities

COURSE THREE **Bion in a Nutshell**

We live in an age of anxiety, a time of great economic and geo-political uncertainty. Understandably, in such times we seek security – financial, vocational, political and social. It is in our loving and intimate relations where we take refuge when all else is in doubt. Our anxious age is, however, also characterized by greater individuation, the need for instant gratification and the pursuit of sexual freedom. Between the poles of anxiety and the pressing pleasure needs there is tension that gets manifested in every human endeavour.

Since cinema tracks conscious and unconscious societal undercurrents, films are no strangers to these themes. To explore the theme of love in an age of anxiety, seven films will be screened on Fridays at 7:30 pm at the Toronto Psychoanalytic Society. The new media are dominating our daily lives, and reshaping society at a very fast pace. In our professional field in particular we cannot afford to ignore them. The more we become aware of their psychological implications, the more effective we will be in our work. The course examines the path of media evolution from Marshall McLuhan's theories in the 1960's to the present vast media scene. Case studies involving new media will be discussed.

COURSE SIX **Reading Lacan**

In this course, we will present and study together Lacan's Seminar XVIII – On a Discourse that Would Not be a Semblance. This work elaborates on the Four Discourses of Seminar XVII and suggests that only the analytic discourse does not rely on the signifier. It is on the side of repetition and jouissance, and deals with the Real. If it is the discourse of the unconscious, it cannot be said directly but can be written and interpreted. This leads to Lacan's elaboration of there is no signifier of sexual difference in the unconscious, and his proposal that "There is no sexual relation." The faculty will act as guides who will orient the members of the group to the readings, elucidate and elaborate concepts, and encourage discussion including the application of the concepts in clinical practice.

COURSE SEVEN **Psychoanalytic Understanding of Work Groups, Organizational Dynamics, and Leadership**

The primary task of this course is the introduction to a psychoanalytic perspective on how groups and organizations—like the individuals who are in them—not only have “known,” conscious, overt, and rational aspects to how they function, but also powerful “unknown,” unconscious, quirky, and irrational dispositions. These unconscious qualities, unrecognized and unacknowledged, risk eroding the organization’s capacity for attending its objectives, compromising its members from achieving their professional goals, promoting the emergence of a toxic culture, and encouraging ineffectual decision making. When explored, this unconscious quality can provide organizations a space for creative and innovative encounters and outputs. Most of us as professionals are part of these settings (departments, committees, associations, etc.).

Each session will be divided into two parts: the first hour will be didactic and interactive, and will explore concepts from selected readings (e.g. Klein, Bion, Menzies, and others). The second part of the evening will make use of the ‘small study group’ format. This will provide the participants a direct opportunity to experience the group process ‘from within’ rather than intellectually ‘from outside’.

COURSE EIGHT **Basic Klein**

This seminar will present the fundamental concepts introduced by Melanie Klein and their significance in the expansion of psychoanalysis since the 1930’s. It follows the principle “Read the classics!” to understand the roots of literature, art, science and here, psychoanalysis, and grasp the origins and scope of contemporary developments. The workshop will necessarily be restricted to basic concepts and their theoretical and clinical significance. Case examples will be used throughout, both from Klein and the lecturers.

Klein’s contributions: context, scope and relevance. Phantasy. The paranoid schizoid position. Projective Identification. The psychopathology of the paranoid schizoid position. Envy. The depressive position. Guilt. The pathology of the depressive position. Normal and pathological mourning.

COURSE NINE **Me, Not-Me, Mine, Not-Mine: Treatment Issues in Adoption and Permanency Planning**

The bonding and attachment processes in biologically unrelated families brings challenges to the children and parents involved. Issues of loss, trauma, identity formation and reflective parenting can be understood through the lens of psychoanalysis and attachment theory. Professionals who work with children or parents across the spectrum of pre-adoption and post-adoption work are welcome to participate in a study and discussion group experience with opportunity for case presentations and consultation.

COURSE TEN **Some Psychoanalytic Ideas on Trauma**

This course will look at different types of trauma and its many and varied clinical expressions. We will present both historical and contemporary ideas from different streams of psychoanalysis always relating theory to clinical work. Each evening a psychoanalyst will present on a specific theme and lead the discussion.

- Dr. Clare Pain will explore war trauma, transcultural and refugee issues using film to illustrate theory and practice.
- Dr. Jacinta O’Hanlon will examine the phenomena of “knowing and not knowing” as it presents in the traumatized person using theorists from Bion to Bromberg and providing examples from Seamus Deane’s “Reading in the Dark”.
- Dr. Christine Dunbar will look at the treatment of those who have suffered preoedipal traumas in addition to other trauma.
- Dr. Michael O’Mahony will discuss cumulative traumas using clinical material and literature.
